HHMBA to host provincials

For the first time since anyone within the Halton Hills Minor Baseball Association can remember, the municipality and the Eagles will play host to provincial championships on the Labour Day weekend.

Baseball Ontario has sanctioned Halton Hills to host the minor peewee AA and B tournaments Sept. 1-3, with a dozen teams in each division.

Eight diamonds are required to accommodate all 46 games, with Georgetown Fairgrounds serving as tourney headquarters. The Gellert Community Centre, Glen Williams and possibly Prospect Park in Acton will also serve as venues. Our teams have been traveling away every Labour Day weekend to all parts of the province so we re happy two keep a couple here and let local fans come and see what is some really good baseball, said tournament convenor Bob Dezeeuw, who added that the HHMBA will host the championships again in 2018.

The minor peewee kids can throw in the mid- to high-50s at this point and they re good technical players at the AA level. The B level usually has a lot of smaller centres and we should compete well in that division.

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Raiders drop Dudley Hewitt opener in OT

An upset loss to start the Dudley Hewitt Cup Tuesday afternoon has already put the Georgetown Raiders in a difficult spot in their quest to capture the Central Canadian Jr. A hockey championship.

The country's second-ranked club lost 5-4 in overtime to the Dryden Ice Dogs in the four-team tourney opener in Trenton and a pivotal contest Wednesday night against the host Golden Hawks could determine whether Georgetown will make it to Saturday's final.


At the very least, the OJHL-champion Raiders will likely have to play five games in as many days to earn their second Dudley Hewitt Cup victory in franchise history, having won the event on home ice in 2005.

But failing to hold three leads and a 1-for-7 success rate on the power play against Dryden could come back to haunt Georgetown, which outshot the Superior International league-winning Ice Dogs 49-29.

The defending Dudley-champ G-Hawks cruised to a 5-1 triumph Tuesday night over the Northern Ontario-representative Powassan VooDoos.

The Raiders will face Powassan Thursday in their final round-robin contest. The semifinal is set for Friday evening at the Duncan Memorial Arena.

It looked to be an ideal start for Georgetown Tuesday as leadingscorer Jack Jacome tallied twice in the first period after getting knocked out of last Wednesday's game seven

of the Buckland Cup, a 1-0 win over Trenton on the Alcott Arena ice.

However, two flukey secondperiod goals by the Ice Dogs, who did carry a 20-game unbeaten streak into the Dudley Hewitt Cup, appeared to give the underdogs a lifeline and they erased two Georgetown leads in the final frame to force OT.

A rebound goal at the 15:50 mark of the extra period for Dryden handed Raider netminder Nick Latinovich his first loss in the post-season in eight starts.

It was expected that Georgetown head coach & GM would go back to Josh Astorino between the pipes for the tilt with Trenton.

Matt McJannet and Ryan Takamatsu had the other Raider markers versus Dryden.
