

Public meeting: severance night

Council received several consent applications to disconnect agricultural land from original farm dwellings. The retained farmland must be rezoned to prohibit the construction of future dwellings. The first one, a 'surplus farm dwelling' at 5591 3rd Line of Guelph-Eramosa (Conc. 3, lot 18), was at the public meeting phase of the request, and three residents from Ward 2 came out to hear the application. Condition #2 barn itself. In theory, occupants of the farm

of Wellington County approval was placed on the consent application: the criteria are that it be rezoned to prohibit future dwelling, taking it from 'A' to 'A21'. The 0.6 hectare farm dwelling is being carved out of the remaining 39 hectares, which is designated Prime Agricultural, Greenlands and Core Greenlands according to the Wellington County official plan.

More severances

Two more similar consent applications were submitted. One caused a bit of consternation, given the way the farm dwelling was proposed to be severed. Located at 7694 Mill road in Ward 2, applicants sought to divide the 40 hectare farm into a 2.6 hectare parcel with the farm and barns on it, giving it 165 meters of frontage, with the severed agricultural land 37.8 hectares in total. At issue was the

dwelling are not using it for agricultural purposes, indicating a 'change of use' and a potential liability as the barn would not likely meet code. Additionally, the resulting lot lines were a bit ragged due to the rational that a diagonal hydro line across the field from the road to the house made it logical to retain the field portion that included the barn. Council concluded that six recommendations would need to be fulfilled, including reducing the dwelling by 0.5 hectares so that the maximum amount of prime already-cultivated land continue to be farmed as part of the severed portion, and, another that applicants just obtain an easement for the hydro line. Councillor Wolk summed it up by saying "Have we not just drawn the wrong line here?" An entrance permit for the retained farmland was also required.
