Murden receives Kiwanis award

Local native Robbie Murden was presented with an award recently by the Kiwanis Club of Utica, N.Y. in recognition of his four years as a student-athlete at nearby Hamilton College.

The Kiwanis Club awards recognize individuals not only for their athletic and academic accomplishments, but for their character as well. The 25-year-old Murden was a two-time NESCAC men's hockey all-conference selection including the first team after the 2015-16 season.

He made the 2016 D3hockey.com East Region all-star team and finished his 92-game Hamilton career with 103 points, with the Christ the King Secondary School graduate also earning a spot on the 2017 NESCAC Winter All-Academic Team for having a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.40.

Murden, an economics major, became the 26th player in program history to reach the 100-point milestone with a goal in the 2017 NESCAC Men's Hockey Championship final after he sat out the entire month of February with an injury.

The former Georgetown Jr. A Raider went on to score two more goals in an NCAA championship first-round win at SUNY Oswego and added an assist in a national quarterfinal at Norwich University. The Continentals won five games when Murden was a freshman. Three seasons later, the men's hockey team enjoyed one of their best campaigns in program history.
