Region says central ambulance comms centre still a risk to patients

According to a recent Halton Region report, the notion of seconds counting in emergencies doesn t appear to resonate with the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long Term Care.

In the report, the region says it has been trying to address a number of concerns at the Mississauga communications centre servicing the region, which have been affecting paramedic services for the last 15 years.

Halton Region has had long-standing concerns with the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC) operated Central Ambulance Communications Centre (CACC) dating back to 2002, said acting Halton Region health commissioner Matthew Ruf in the report.

As a result of challenges at the communications centre there have been call delays resulting in increased response times, he added.

While the ambulance communication centre is responsible for dispatching ambulances and paramedics, the region is responsible for providing those services.
