Walters named CJHLs Coach of the Year

Having completed his seventh season behind the Georgetown bench, Walters led the Raiders to the best record in the 22-team Ontario Junior Hockey League with an impressive 45-5-2-2 mark.

His efforts aided his club in claiming their first-ever league regular season crown with Georgetown s .870 winning percentage and 94 points both being new franchise records.

The Raiders also won their first-ever OJHL playoff title and came within a goal of advancing to the RBC Cup national champi-

onship in Cobourg this past week, which was won in an upset by the host Cougars 3-2 in overtime Sunday over the top-ranked Brooks Bandits of Alberta.

Walters has also served as general manager for the Raiders during his stay here and the club was

ranked second in the CJHL through much of the season.

The 46-year-old Calgary native was selected in the fourth round of the 1990 NHL Draft by the Toronto Maple Leafs and played several seasons of minor pro hockey before joining the OHLs Sarnia Sting as an assistant coach for eight years.

The Raiders were the most dominant team in the OJHL as the home side in 2016-17, losing only once in regulation as they went 26-1-1-0.
