Sherwin-Williams spruces things up

Paint-store conglomerate Sherwin-Williams recently opened a store on Mountainview Road in Georgetown and made a significant splash by donating labour and materials to spruce up a new facility recently purchased by Community Living North Halton.

Twenty-six volunteers from Sherwin-Williams in total put in at least a few hours to paint the expansive Hshaped former ranch-style residence located at the north end of Halton Hills, which is being converted to house rooms for training staff, exercise and respite rooms along with a frenovated kitchen area. CLNH is now also renting an adjacent 1,800-square-foot house for its operations from Community Living Burlington.

We had outgrown our previous location in Milton and this building provides us with both the space and versatility that we were looking for, said CLNH properties co-ordinator Jonathan Wahab.

Sherwin-Williams donated approximately 50 gallons of paint for the sprucing up and the company s contribution to the project is estimated at about \$10,000.

Every year we have a dedicated national sales week, said Sherwin-Williams s Halton sales manager Shannon Nicol.
