Bulldogs hit the road on eve of post-season

In their final regular-season home game of the Ontario Jr. B Lacrosse League campaign, the Halton Hills Bulldogs found out how difficult its going to be to emerge as the best in the East Conference.

The 14-3 Green Gaels of Clarington own the top seed in the conference after defeating the 12-4-1 Bulldogs 14-7 Saturday at the Alcott Arena in what looked like a rematch of last summers playoff series between the two rival clubs.

Clarington's Brenden Lundy scored shorthanded goals 33 seconds apart late in the opening period to send the visitors on their way.

Halton Hills was outshot 41-28. Cody Menzies (3), John Vezina (2) and Mason Wright (2) scored for the home side, which was eliminated from the 2016 post-season by the Gaels 3-1 in their best-of-5 second-round series.

The Jr. B leagues trade deadline passed on Saturday with the Bulldogs making a pair of deals to bring in a total of four 21-year-olds, with no players going the other direction.

Halton Hills acquired Liam Nesbitt and Josh Bryers from the Hamilton Bengals as well as Ben Heidecker and Quenton Begin from the Guelph Regals.

The Bulldogs traveled to Port Credit to take on the Mississauga Tomahawks Wednesday night, followed by a trip to eastern Ontario to finish out the schedule against the 11-4 Akwesasne Indians and the 10-5 Kahnawake Hunters on the weekend.

Halton Hills sits second in the conference standings, just a point up on Akwesasne and Kahnawake.
