Leathertown Festival will offer local and family entertainers

With the Leathertown Festival less than a month away on August 13, Acton BIA manager Sheena Switzer is finalizing the line up. "As with previous years, our focus will be on local and family entertainment."

Switzer is expecting a robust turnout of anywhere from 10,000 to

12,000 people. "Sharon and Bram are a big draw," she said. The popular children's performers will take to the main stage at the east end of Mill Street from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m.

There are 13 main acts featured in this year's festival, everything from a magician to a jug band. As well, the festival is still in the process of hiring buskers.

The performances will take place on three stages along Mill Street. A community stage will be set up a the Acton Mews, and a secondary stage, the Tanner Stage, will be located at the west end of town near the Roxy. According to Switzer some half-hour slots are still available for musicians and community groups.
