## Regional Council advocated Town receives funding for for regional priorities at AMO Foreign Direct Investment attraction

Along with more than 1,900 delegates, Halton's Regional Chair and Councillors participated in the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Annual Conference, which took place in Ottawa from August 13 to 16. The Conference brought together municipal, provincial and federal officials to work collectively to overcome municipal challenges and plan for the future.

Key session topics included the need for new and modern approaches to funding municipal government, changes to the Ontario Municipal Board

(OMB), infrastructure and transit, climate change, new waste legislation, the digital and sharing economy, affordable housing, and more. These province-wide issues have important local implications for our community.

The AMO Conference was an opportunity to bring Halton's priority advocacy issues to the attention of Provincial Cabinet Ministers. Halton Region has been advocating for legislative and funding changes on issues that are important to Halton residents.

"The meetings we had

with the Ministers were very successful," said Halton Regional Chair, Gary Carr. "We were able to bring forward issues and concerns related to growth funding and coordination, public health funding shortfalls, and needed transportation enhancements, among others. We will continue to follow up with the Ministers to advance our positions and find solutions to our issues."
