Halton Police are looking for this man in connection with a series of purse and bag thefts since July 2016.

Serial purse snatchers targeting women at Halton hotels since 2016

The Halton Regional Police Service (HRPS) is looking for the public's help in identifying a man suspected in a number of purse thefts across Halton Region since

Police believe the man, who may be working with an accomplice, is responsible for a number of purse thefts from hotels and restaurants across the region and beyond over that time.

In a release sent Monday (Aug. 28), police said the thefts began in July 2016 and have continued sporadically across Halton Region since. Investigators believe the suspects are responsible for at least 15 such thefts in Halton

The suspects are also believed to be responsible for similar thefts in both Toronto and York Region.

The latest reported incident occurred on Sunday (Aug. 20). Halton police have not provided any specific details of individual incidents but are reporting a number of similarities between

"It is also believed the male suspect works with an accomplice, who acts as a driver and/or distraction while the theft occurs," wrote Halton police in the release.

"The suspect targets women, usually foreign tourists, who use the back of their chairs to hang their purse on.

The suspect is usually seen on his cellular phone and approaches the chair. Using the cover of his own jacket, he casually removes the purse from victim's chair and leaves with it concealed," it added.

Police added the thefts usually occur during breakfast hours at hotels or dinner time at standalone restaurants.

In an accompanying document to the release, Halton Police referred to the crimes as "distraction thefts".

"Distraction thieves work in teams and often approach their victims with an offer of assistance such as claiming that you have dropped something, including money on the ground. While you are distracted, an accomplice steals your purse or bag," added

Police are advising residents and visitors to never leave personal items (purse, phone, wallet etc.) unattended.

If staying at a hotel, utilize the in-room safe for expensive items/ cash if possible and are suggesting people not carry large amounts of cash on their person.

"The Halton Regional Police Service would like to remind everyone to be aware of their personal belongings while in public places, specifically hotels and restaurants," said HRPS in the re-

Remove elastic bands from vegetables such as broccoli, celery, green onions and asparagus.



No stickers.

Remove the sticker from fruit and vegetables such as bananas, apples, pears, peaches and peppers.
