## Amendment to Community Improvement Plan presented at public meeting

A draft amendment to the Halton Hills Community Improvement Plan (CIP) was followed with a statutory public meeting on Monday night. The purpose was only to inform the public. Decisions will be made later. The CIP, approved in 2010, encourages rehabilitation of properties, development, and changes in land use, which increases the town's tax base. Eight sub-areas have been identified, and a chart shows incentive programs available to each. In some cases, several programs are available to some areas and in others only one. For example, in the 'Industrial Parks' subarea, only the 'Landscape Improvement Grant' is available.

Advertised in The New Tanner on August 31, the amendments were a response to residents' requests for an extension of the sub-areas identified in the initial plan. Senior planner Tara Buonpensiero outlined three criteria for expanding the CIP to such sites that would ensure the objectives of the CIP would still be met. The goal is to make it easy for staff to determine eligibility of those outside the sub-areas, with only commercial mixed use and institutional uses to be considered as per the original plan. One

is that improvements to the building be in compliance with the Town's Official Plan. The property must also be within the 'Georgetown or Acton Urban Area' as defined in the Official Plan while extending eligibility to properties beyond the eight CIP sub-areas. The property must have frontage on an 'arterial road', defined as those major streets with a concentration of businesses. Councillor Lewis sought clarity on the issue of rural businesses, and Planning and Sustainability Commissioner John Linhardt assured him that Trafalgar road, Winston Churchill, and Ninth Line are examples where rural businesses qualify.

One delegation appeared Monday. Pat Farley of Georgetown expressed concern that the historic aesthetic of downtown Georgetown was not consistent, given that a few newer businesses had a "sleek modern look". She asked that since Halton Hills now has a full-time Heritage Planner, would they be consulted, to which Mr. Linhardt replied, "Yes, that would certainly be our intent." Next steps are to compile comments and prepare a future report for council on the disposition of this amendment. October 13 is the deadline for written submissions.


