Fatal truck crash on Highway 7

A single vehicle crash and fatality Tuesday morning on Hwy. 7 west of Acton closed the highway for several hours. Apparently, a straight truck travelling eastbound on Hwy. 7, east of Crewson's Corners, struck a hydro pole pinning the male

driver in the vehicle.

The scene was attended by the OPP and four vehicles from Halton Hills Fire Department shortly after 6 a.m. According to deputy chief Harry Olivieri, 18 firefighters helped to extricate the individual from the wreckage after which he was pronounced

deceased by paramedics.

The name of the driver had not been released at press time, and the highway remained closed between Crewson's Corners and Dublin Line into the early afternoon. The OPP's collision reconstruction team remained on the scene for most of the day.
