# Resurfacing and road construction projects set to begin in May

Some Acton streets will be repaved this summer. Although the contracts have yet to be formerly awarded, School Lane, Nelson Court and Jeffery Ave. will get new asphalt surfaces beginning in May at a cost of about \$300,000. Some minor remedial work by the Region remains to be completed in the Nelson Court and Jeffrey Ave. area on 18 wastewater laterals, but is expected to have minimal effect on property owners.

A bigger project is being undertaken in

Limehouse, which will see full reconstruction of a section of 22 Side road. The work will include curbs and storm sewer, and a multi-use path on the north side from Fifth Line to Wolseley Street at a price tag of approximately \$1,000,000. According to Alexandra Fuller, manager for corporate relations for the Town: "A sidewalk will be added on the south side from Fifth Line to Toltan Park. Resurfacing and reconfiguration of the Limehouse Public school parking lot will also be completed, as well as the addition of a community parking lot on the Toltan Park site."
