Vintage Acton's walking tour series kicks off

Scott Brooks hosted Vintage Acton's inaugural historic walking tour on Saturday afternoon. About half a dozen participants started the trek from the parkette at the corner of Mill and Main Streets and moved eastward, crisscrossing Mill Street and finishing the trip at the Red Harp.

Brooks, a local historian and publisher of the Vintage Acton Facebook site, used a hand-held PA to provide waking commentary about the provenance of the downtown buildings and facades. He supplemented his insight with photographs from the Dills' collection, peeling back the layers of history. Take for instance the Braida's Shoe Store at 19 Mill Street which had several incarnations as a shoe store from the 1940s on, and still looks like one with its prominent display windows.

"I'm trying to show that change isn't new to Acton, we keep evolving every few years. People

complain about change, but I can show people that downtown Acton has been through hard times before and we're seeing some new things happening now," said Brooks.

Highlights on the tour included the Acton Free Press building, the former Storey House—now MacKinnnon Funeral Home—and the defunct Baptist Church now Acton Optical.

Brooks says that the downtown historical walk is not a new concept. "This walk used to be done many years ago by people that aren't around anymore, like Mac Sprowl and Hartley Coles. I thought, why not revive something like this? There seems to be a lot of interest in the history of Acton, and I keep getting asked things like what is the story behind this and that building?"

Brooks and Vintage Acton have more walking tours planned this summer. The next one is at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 31, starting at the Main Street Parkette and proceeding north on Main Street.
