## Glen Williams Hotel

Though unrecognizable today, the duplex close to the northwest corner of Prince and Main Streets in the "Glen" was once the Glen Williams Hotel pictured here circa 1910. Built in 1849 by William Alexander, it served as a tavern for travellers and farmers waiting for their grain to be ground to flour or trees to be sawn into boards at the local mills. With the introduction of national prohibition in 1919, it became a boarding house with the adjacent stables as a "boarding house" for horses– potential Queen's Plate winners were housed here by Seagram Distillers for many years. In 1946, the building now known as the Glen Oven Café was built in the stableyard.
