HPVs to blame for many cancers

The October 17 edition of *The Independent & Free Press* included a brief article entitled "HPV debate put on hold".

While, I was unaware that the Halton Catholic District School Board had banned public health nurses from administering the HPV (Human papillomavirus) vaccine in their schools, I am pleased that Burlington Trustee John Morrison would like to reopen the discussion.

However, it should have been noted in your article that HPV is not JUST "a common virus that is usually spread during sexual activity and skin-to-skin contact with an infected person". I believe it is more important to mention that high-risk HPVs cause virtually all cervical cancers. They also cause most anal cancers and some vaginal, vulvar, penile, and oropharyngeal cancers.

Health Canada has approved two HPV vaccines that will pre-

vent cervical cancer in women and anal cancer in men. This issue is so much more than preventing the spread of a sexually transmitted disease, it is the first vaccine that has been proven to prevent some types of cancer.
