The tailoring is one of the most important expenses, something you don't want to skimp on—tailoring is necessary on most garments to achieve the finest fit.

It can all sound so overwhelming but finding your perfect gown is really quite simple. Starting with an inspiration or a vision is always a good beginning. Next, find your salon and consultant and book a one-hour appointment. If you have some ideas of what you picture as your perfect gown share it with the staff at the shop. Images or magazine clippings that most appeal to you can be a great way to share that vision. Flipping through the gowns on their hangers won't help you find that gown; the experts know their inventory best and can assist you in finding what you are looking for. This kind of experience doesn't always come for free so take advantage of it!

Don't be too discouraged if your style ideas don't come to fruition—most of us don't look

like the models in the magazines. Some brides will find their style sense works for them while others become frustrated if their ideas don't come together as expected. Often, the biggest mistake is visiting too many stores and trying on too many gowns with too many opinions—it simply leads to confusion. Keep an open mind, allow the sales staff to steer you into a different direction; the experienced eye can often suggest something that you may have overlooked. Follow your heart and remember your opinion is the ONLY opinion.
