Nancy has promoted a monthly silent auction, encouraged the store to be part of the Acton BIA through events such as the Holiday Magic on Mill & Main, Acton Winter Carnival and just recently the Swag Bags for the new Acton GO Station commuters.

Often, customers will come in to the store looking for a certain item and if it isn't there, LaRose takes down their phone number and contacts them when she finds it.

Entrepreneur of the Year

"I actually started crying I was so excited," said Andrea Clark, owner of Tanner's Pub and Grill, of her reaction when she learned she was named Entrepreneur of the Year.

"For a small town business, Andrea gets it," said Kathleen Percy of Acton in her nomination letter recommending Clark for the award.

Clark owns Tanner's with her stepfather Rick Matchett. They took over the business in 2007 and changed the format and menu to pub fare.

Percy said she's raised the level of awareness of the business in the community and "taken the outdoor space

and created the nicest patio in Halton Hills."

Percy said Clark sponsors Acton hockey, baseball and Acton BIA events such as Acton Winter Carnival Chili Cook-off and Leathertown Festival, and collected the most money for local fundraiser Paws for Austin.

"Andrea has also brought the business out of the pub. She is always happy to accommodate her client and brings her staff along to serve/cater events such as the Mayor's Masquerade Ball and Acton Winter Carnival.

The business also caters for Acton Senior's Centre and Links2Care.

"Andrea is all about providing the utmost for her customers and it amazes me that she will close her business to ensure someone's special evening is special."

Clark employs 14 people year-round, plus more during the summer.

Andrea has worked in the restaurant location under its previous names since she was 15 years old and can most often be found cooking in the kitchen.

"I was surprised anyone knew me," said Clark.
