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Thief swipes \$12,000 in rings from mall store

Halton Police are looking for a man in connection with the theft of 12 men's rings, valued at approximately \$12,000, from Brilliant Gold Jewellery in Georgetown Market Place Friday morning.

At about 11 a.m. a man entered the store and asked to look at a men's sapphire ring. He tried on several rings, returned them to the clerk, then left the store. He returned at about 11:50 a.m. and asked to see the sapphire ring again.

When the clerk put the tray of 12 rings on the counter, he grabbed it, and ran out the door. He got into a black pickup truck parked in the north parking lot near the Winners entrance and was last seen driving eastbound in the lot.

The rings are valued at between \$500 and \$1,500 each.

The man is described as white, in his mid to late 30s, 5'7" to 5'8" tall, 150 lbs. with a thin medium build. He had blue eyes and a scruffy, light facial hair.

Extracurriculars returning to public secondary schools

Extracurricular activities are finally returning to local public high schools after months of inactivity.

"What we're seeing in secondary is a return to teacher supervision of extracurricular activities in a fairly expedient way. It's coming back very quickly," said Halton District School Board director of education David Euale.

The same cannot be said, however, about elementary schools.

Public schools in Ontario have been mostly without extracurricular activities since early in the school year, after elementary and secondary school teachers cancelled supervision of afterschool programming in protest of the provincial government's passing of Bill 115.

However, in late February,

the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation (OSSTF) has announced it had lifted its ban on extracurriculars. In the few weeks since the ban has been lifted, teachers have returned to supervising extracurriculars at local high schools.

"I was at Oakville Trafalgar yesterday (Thursday) and every one of their activities is back online. Every single one of them. That's one example," said superintendent of education Stuart Miller, who has been working with high school principals to get the scope of the return of extracurricular activities.

"There is a complete return of all spring sports, almost a complete return of every school being involved in spring sports."
