

Region of Halton meeting, and that government will also begin following the application.

"We know immediately that there will be truck traffic impact, but to what degree we don't know," said Bonnette.

The Bolton-based company is also asking Guelph-Eramosa Township to rezone the 39.4-hectare site of Hidden Quarry from agricultural land to allow extraction to 30 metres below the water table. Dick spokesperson Greg Sweetnam says it's named Hidden Quarry because trees screen it.

"We won't have any impact on water quality or quantity,"



highway access to markets in the northern portion of the Greater Toronto Area. But the excavation of 700,000 tonnes of

gravel and rock a year would send at least 26 heavy and dusty trucks an hour onto the two-lane Highway 7, through Acton to Hwy. 401, merging with an equal number of Dufferin Aggregates trucks just south of Acton, stated a blog on the website www. crcrockwood.org, created by the newly-

formed Concerned Residents Coalition (CRC).

Though the quarry is in Guelph-Eramosa Township, Linda Sword of CRC said it would also impact Rockwood, Halton Hills and Milton. That includes quality-of-life factors such as extraction noise, dust and truck traffic, and larger issues such as effects on property values.

"There are two ways of looking at this," said Sword. Firstly, the source water, in the easternmost part of the Grand River Watershed, is pristine, with rock extraction raising concerns about water quality, levels and flow through the watershed system. Groundwater there feeds a trout creek that courses into the Eramosa River heading south.

"The other interesting thing is this quarry is across the street, literally across Highway 7, from the (provincial) Greenbelt. There we are protecting our water, our wetlands and forests and agricultural properties and it just takes a highway to separate us from aggregate digging. It's sort of ironic."

Sweetnam said he would try to resolve public concerns, though he warned if the proposal is rejected, the company could ultimately appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board for resolution. —With files from The Guelph Mercury
