

Koppers opts for Mac

With scholarship offers from a couple of NCAA Division I U.S. colleges tempting him, Brandon Koppers has instead decided to stick closer to home to play volleyball and study commerce for the next four years.

The 6-foot-7 outside hitter committed to McMaster University recently, during the same week that he received the Ontario Volleyball Association's Ken Davies Memorial Award while playing for his club team, the under-18 Mississauga Pakmen, at the provincial championships in Waterloo.

"There were a few reasons why I chose Mc-

Master," said the Grade 12 Christ the King student and captain of the Jaguars' senior boys' volleyball squad.

"Their sense of community and family was a big one. Just the way they do things in practice and overall on campus as a team, it really attracted me to Mac. Also, their phenomenal record (runners-up for the Canadian university championship this past year). Their coach (Dave Preston) is great and he's the junior national team coach too. Plus, I've played with a bunch of Mac guys when we were on Team Ontario together and I've really gotten to know them really well."

Being enrolled in McMaster's well-regarded DeGroote School of Business also played a large part in Koppers's decision, along with being less than an hour from home.

On the court, Koppers has blossomed into a frightening image at the net for opposing defenders because of his large wingspan and powerful spikes. Soccer was actually his favourite sport until age 11 when he started playing in elementary school.

He joined the Pakmen's house league in Grade 9 after his coach at CtK, Meaghan O'Brien, suggested that volleyball might take him somewhere if he wanted to put in the extra effort.

A couple of years later and a few inches taller, Koppers was leading the under-16 Pakmen to an undefeated season, with provincial and national titles on his mantelpiece. University scouts started flocking to his games. As a 15-year-old, he was named to the all-star team at the OVA under-17 championships and earned an invitation to play for the Team Ontario under-18s.

"Brandon is extremely talented but equally as grounded, and is able to maintain perspective in even the toughest situations," said McMaster coach Preston.

"His character is exemplary and it won't be long before Marauder Nation sees what a great ambassador Brandon is for being successful the Marauder Way."
