

Hurricane Hazel paid a visit

It started as one of those weather forecasts we pay little attention to as local residents tuned in their radios Friday, October 15, 1954 and heard reports that a hurricane called Hazel had ravaged the town of Myrtle Beach in South Carolina and was working its way toward the east side of Toronto. After leaving a trail of destruction and death in its wake, it came inland, and pounded its way through upper New York State, before crossing Lake Ontario with 100 m.p.h. winds and torrential rain. Local residents, especially those in Norval, recall the destruction vividly, as the storm eventually destroyed the village's old grist mill (above).
