Residents pack hall to question Heritage Register listing

Several area residents made it clear to the Town of Halton Hills at a public information session last week they don't want their property listed on a Heritage

Approximately 120 people were at the meeting at Mold-Masters Sportsplex Thursday evening to learn more about the Register— a listing of properties in

town that have been identified of heritage value. The Town is proposing to add 357 properties to the Register, and the residents at the meeting had been notified that their properties are one of them.

Another session for affected property owners is scheduled for Feb. 27.

Ward 3 Councillor Moya Johnson, chair of Heritage Halton Hills, said the list is a requirement from the Provincial government.

"It's not something we decided to do,

we had to do it," said Johnson.

She said being on the Register places no restriction on the property owner for anything they want to do to their house, except if they want to tear it down.

"The only restriction is you have to provide the Town 60 days notice if you have a wish to demolish the building," said Johnson.

During those 60 days, she said, the Town can decide whether or not the
