Stamp out measles

Like a villain of horror movie cliché, the lifethreatening measles virus is back, this time with a threatening measies virus is back, this time with a vengeance. Once considered virtually eliminated in this country, measles has stricken hundreds of Canadians so far this year.

Measles cases have been reported in Ontario,
Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

This is worrisome news on two fronts. First,

children are suffering and in real danger. Most hit by measles endure a blotchy red rash, puffy eyes, a fever and then recover. But some also experience pneumonia and even inflammation of the brain causing permanent damage. Tragically, about one in 1,000 dies.

The second reason for worry is that Canadians have become dangerously vulnerable to the spread of this disease. Too many parents are deciding not to vaccinate their children, either through a misplaced fear that immunization is harmful, religious fundamentalism or simple complacency and neglect.

Whatever their reason, it's an ill-judged omission that puts kids at needless risk. The painful irony is that almost every measles outbreak in Canada could have been prevented through timely immunization. Local outbreaks are generally triggered when people carrying the measles virus arrive from outside Canada. Ontario's most recent confirmed case is a Brampton infant arriving on a flight from Abu Dhabi.

Around the world, measles kills about 122,000 people a year — mostly children. That's 330 a day. And as long as Canadians travel the world, returning from areas where measles is endemic, kids who aren't immunized will be at risk.

Family doctors need to forcefully make that case to parents unsure about vaccination for their children. It's a safe, highly effective treatment that can ward off a world of suffering.


