

A storied past

The W.H. Storey and Son Glove Factory on Bower Avenue in Acton was erected in 1882 and razed in 1962. This was a major industry in the community, employing up to 250 people. The Storeys sold the company to H.T. Arnold, a Georgetown resident who ran the business from 1915 to 1954. The post office was built in 1963 on the same site.
