Many different people deal with my daily care here but I know I can trust them and they will keep me safe so my behavior has improved. How-

ever, I am still insecure with visitors and in social situations am very fearful of strangers which makes me not present at my best.

When I relaxed with people I trust I love my belly rubbed, playing ball and hanging around in the kitchen or outdoors where playing or walkies are very much enjoyed. I love to collect little treasures on my walk which makes the walker smile, I bring back

> twigs, pieces of paper or even a small pebble...it comforts me to carry something as we walk along. I feel proud!

> In summary, I would do well in a home with a family with one or two dog experienced adults that have the skills to teach me boundaries and maintain a steady routine. I would probably benefit form a multi-dog home, where I can learn from them

and raise my confidence level.

I must have a home with ABSOLUTELY NO CHILDREN because staff feel that being raised in a daycare situation may have contributed to my confidence issue. (Note: To gain my confidence before adoption, I would love you to come and visit me several times so we can get to know each other).




Rescuing the abandoned


