MaRS more Liberal red ink

If you've heard of MaRS in the news media recently, you likely thought at first that they were talking about Earth's neighbour, the red planet.

After reading this, you will wish it was so.

In actual fact, it was most likely a reference to the latest Liberal spending boondoggle, and more Liberal red ink.

MaRS stands for Medical and Related Sciences. It started off a few years ago as an interesting idea to cre-

ate an innovation cluster in downtown Toronto. where scientific research might lead to new discoveries that could be marketed commercially.

Not content with the initial success of MaRS, the Liberal Government decided to build MaRS "phase 2," supported by a \$224 million loan from Infrastructure Ontario, a provincial crown agency.

That led to the construction of a 20-storey

office tower across the road from Queen's Park, which now stands almost 70 per cent empty.

Because it can't attract enough tenants to fill its vacant space, MaRS has defaulted on its loan to the province.

The government wants to spend \$65 million of our money to buy out their U.S.-based real estate partner, so they can reduce the rents and attract tenants.

At the same time, another arm of the government, the Ministry of Research and Innovation, has begun paying the interest on the MaRS loan. The cost to taxpayers: \$450,000 a

Recently, it came to light that the government deliberately changed the rules in 2010 to allow for the MaRS loan. Previously, Infrastructure Ontario loans were intended primarily to be

a source of financing for much needed = municipal infrastructure projects.

unicipal infrastructure projects.

And despite our efforts at committee hearings in recent days, the government is stonewalling and refusing to disclose relevant documentation related to Infrastructure Ontario's loan © to MaRS.

Most troubling of all, the minis- > ter responsible for MaRS refuses to divulge the upper limit of what the government is prepared to pay going forward into the MaRS money pit.

After eHealth, the cancelled gas plants and the Ornge air ambulance debacles, has the Liberal government not learned a thing?

While the recall of the Legislature was later this

fall than usual, it's worth noting that the House sat for several weeks during the summer after the June 12 provincial election.
