What should I do if I think someone is being abused?

- If someone is in immediate danger, call 911.
- Never talk to anyone about abuse in front of • Never talk to anyon their suspected abuser.
- Unless she specifically asks for it, never give her materials about domestic abuse or leave information through voice messages or emails that might be discovered by her abuser. However, abuse thrives in secrecy, so speak up if you can do so safely.
- If she wants to talk, listen. If she doesn't, tell her she does not deserve to be hurt and that you are concerned for her safety.
