

Cameron 14th at OFSAA cross-country

Mackenzie Cameron of Christ the King Secondary School had the highest individual finish out of the local-area runners who competed in the provincial championships on Saturday near Collingwood.

The Golden Horseshoe-champion Cameron placed 14th out of 279 athletes in the senior girls' 5K event at the Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association-sanctioned meet held at the Highlands Nordic facility in Duntroon.

The Jaguars' senior girls ended up 11th in the team standings, with Stephanie Knowles (76th), Stefanie Parsons (141st), Kayla Chaner (206th) and Sydney Ireland (216th) contributing to the points total.

Georgetown Rebel Meghan Sippel finished 34th and Allison Sippel was 111th amongst the senior girls.

CtK's midjet boys were 23rd overall in team points headed up by Brandon Ponomarew's 29th-place result. Jacob White (165th), Johnny Boulanger (212th), Derek Urie (221st) and Daniel Nascimento (246th) rounded out the Jags' performance in the 5K race.

Justin Lavictoire (73rd) and Cam Cherwaiko (81st) lead the Jaguar junior boys to a 26th-place team standing, followed by Mitchell Shorgan (216th), Jean-Sebastien Pearce (241st) and Thomas Green (255th) over 6K.

Raiders net a weekend split

The Georgetown Raiders let a solid road effort go to waste Sunday night against one of the Ontario Junior Hockey League's best clubs after surrendering a late goal against the Toronto Jr. Canadiens in a 3-2 defeat.

First-period goals by Elliot Ashur and Arran MacDonald put the Raiders in control, by the Jr. Canadiens, who eliminated Georgetown from the playoffs last season, chipped away at the lead and netted the winner with just over a minute remaining in the third period.

On Saturday night, the Raiders trailed the last-place Milton IceHawks 2-1 after the opening frame before rallying for a 5-3 victory, led by pair of goals by defenceman Matthew Cairns.

Bailey Molella, Brendan Jacome and leading scorer Daniel Hardie into an empty net also tallied for the home side, which outshot Milton 44-23. The 13-6-2-0 Raiders hosted the Orangeville Flyers Wednesday evening and travel to Newmarket to face the Hurricanes Thursday night.
