Helping Halton move through Active Transportation

On Nov. 12, Halton Regional Council endorsed, in principle, the new Active Transportation Master Plan (ATMP) that will support and promote a first-class transportation network.

The ATMP will help promote

integrated, sustainable and efficient transportation network for residents, businesses and commuters, as well as encourage active transportation and allow residents and visitors to travel in a safe and efficient manner.

Active Transportation refers to any form of

human-powered transportation, including walking, cycling, in-line skating, skateboarding and moving with mobility devices.

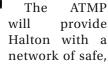
It's about getting to work or school, going shopping, running errands, visiting friends and family, or other trips by walking, biking or rolling.

Through the implementation of the ATMP, Halton will work in partnership with the local municipalities to invest approximately \$110 million to build 470 kilometres of new on-road infrastructure (i.e., bike lanes) and an ad-

ditional 359 kilometres of new off-road infrastructure (i.e., sidewalks and multi-use trails) along Regional roads by the year 2031.

The ATMP is designed to support policies and growth set out in the Halton Trans-

portation Master Plan (TMP) – the Road to Change, aimed at delivering a balanced and multi-modal transportation system serving all road users, including cyclists and pedestrians.
