BURLINGTON - The City of Burlington's fire department is looking for a few good volunteer firefighters to join the squad.

Volunteer applications are being accepted online from Thursday, March 1 to Friday, March 16 at 11:59 p.m.

"We are looking for people

who can help advance the Burlington Fire Department's commitment to public safety and are interested in a challenging opportunity to serve Burlington as a volunteer firefighter," said Deputy Fire Chief Karen Roche.

"Being a volunteer firefighter is no ordinary job; the work is

varied and challenging, but also highly rewarding."

The local fire department consists of professional and volunteer firefighters. New recruits will be assigned to fire headquarters at station no. 1, 1255 Fairview St., or Fire station no. 5, 2241 Kilbride St., based on where the applicant lives.

The Kilbride station covers the rural areas of Burlington, mostly north of No. 2 Sideroad.

All applicants must be:

- be aged 18 years or older and legally entitled to work in Canada;
- pass a health and medical evaluation, and fitness assessment;
- have a permanent residence within six minutes travel time to station no. 5 or live in Burlington within 20 minutes of station no. 1.

MUNICIPAL CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT STUDY Regional Road 25 Transportation Corridor Improvements Steeles Avenue (Regional Road 8) to 5 Side Road, Town of Milton/Town of Halton Hills PR-3130A

Study

Halton Region has initiated a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (MCEA) Study for Regional Road 25 from Steeles Avenue (Regional Road 8) to 5 Side Road, in the Town of Milton and Town of Halton Hills. The MCEA Study will consider a wide range of road improvement alternatives as well as intersection improvements, active transportation and overall traffic operations. The impact of road improvements on social, cultural, economic and natural environments will also be evaluated and assessed during the study.

Process

The study is being conducted in compliance with Schedule C of the *Municipal Class Environmental Assessment* (October 2000, amended 2007, 2011 and 2015), which is approved under the *Ontario Environmental Assessment Act*.

A key component of the study will be consultation with interested stakeholders (public and regulatory agencies) through Public Information Centres (PIC). The first Public Information Centre has been arranged for:
