Georgetown captures 10th consecutive OFSAA overall swim title

In what figured to be a lean year for Georgetown District High School's swim team, the squad came back from Windsor this week with two more provincial championship banners to hang in the gymnasium.

Georgetown earned its 10th straight Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations' overall team title by a fairly comfortable margin, outpointing runner-up Waterloo Collegiate 1,348 to 769

Highlights included a gold-medal performance by the senior boys' 200-m freestyle relay team consisting of Thomas Schofield, Luke Mannell, Haydn Bennett and Justin Hume - along with a silver relay medal and a few individual bronze medals.

GDHS also took top spot in the junior girls' team category. As well, Olivia Crowe of Georgetown's Christ the King Jaguars placed third in the senior girls' 200-m

Georgetown skated to the South/West Conference quarterfinal victory in hardly a cakewalk, as the result of all four games was in doubt until the late stages.

Game four was tied at two after two periods and 3-3 with less than six minutes left in regulation before Andrew Court potted the winner, which was followed by a pair of short-handed empty-netters by Jake Payette and Austin Cho at venerable St. Michaels' College Arena.

The lone Georgetown resident of the team, rookie Jaden Condotta, scored his first goal as a Raider

to give the visitors an early 2-0 advantage. Derek McVey and Jordan Crocker also tallied, with Troy Timpano making 30 stops for the W.

Although it hasn't been officiallvdetermined, it's a safe bet that the second-seeded Raiders will take on the conference's third-place club, the North York Rangers, in round two of the post-season.
