SUSPECT A HABITUAL IMPAIRED DRIVER IS OPERATING IN HALTON? YOU CAN REPORT THEM ANONYMOUSLY

Halton Crime Stoppers is taking aim at impaired driving.

In the wake of a fatal Nov. 5 accident in Oakville that saw a 27-year-old Mississauga man killed and a 22-year-old Welland man charged with impaired driving causing death, Crime Stoppers of Halton is asking residents to help police get impaired drivers off the streets.

The non-profit, non-police organization that encourages members of the public to anonymously communicate information regarding criminal activity, in exchange for cash, emphasized that if residents suspect an impaired driver on the road they should call 911 to report it directly and immediately to police.

However, if residents know of or suspect a habitual impaired driver and

wish to report them, but remain anonymous they can contact Crime Stoppers.

Halton Crime Stoppers director David Wood noted that so far this year, impaired driving tips to Halton Crime Stoppers have resulted in licence suspensions, criminal charges, vehicle impoundments, and several other Highway Traffic Act offences.

He argued those tips directly helped improve the safety of local roads and communities, and may have prevented the next horrific, heartbreaking and completely preventable tragedy.

"Our mission is to reduce crime in Halton Region through community education and engagement in partnership with the public, the police, and the media, and by providing citizens the ability to provide information with

guaranteed anonymity to deter and solve crime, with rewards offered for tips that lead to an arrest," said Wood.

"We appreciate the impaired driving tips we receive from the public and are proud that these tips can and do directly translate into effective action by Halton police to get impaired drivers off our roads."

He said there are no shortage of reasons for residents to participate with Halton police, noting there have been 500 impaired driving arrests in Halton so far this year- a number that is only expected to increase as the holiday season approaches.
