ready until the first week of August. However, unusually hot weather could help the crops along faster.

"If I'd planted two weeks ago, the seed would be rotting," Allison said.

The Allisons have been farming in Georgetown since the late 1960s, and in the 1970s started growing sweet corn.

Today, Allison grows sweet corn and pumpkins, and his brother grows cash crops.

In 1975, the family opened the farm market, specializing in sweet corn during the summer and pumpkins in the fall. In 1997, Allison built a new farm market and expanded the range of farm-fresh produce, as well as creating room for produce from other local farmers.

Aside from the farm market, the Allisons have attended the Downtown Georgetown Farmers Market since it opened.

"We won't be there until there are local strawberries," Allison said. "They'll be

late, too."

Though strawberries are already in the ground, the weather has delayed the crop by about a week.
