"We are fortunate to have highly trained paramedics who work hard to help keep our community safe every day," said Regional Chair Gary Carr. "They perform lifesaving skills, educate residents on important health and safety practices and work around the clock to provide urgent medical care to residents when they need it most."

Halton has more than 270 paramedics who respond to over 50,000 calls and transport in excess of 30,000 patients annually. Operating from 12 ambulance stations, they provide pre-hospital care to residents in Burlington, Halton Hills, Milton and Oakville.
