**Dundas Cactus Festival:** 

Internationally recognized for Cacti production by local Ben Veldhuis Cactus Greenhouses, Dundas became home to its own Cactus Festival. The first festival more than 40 years ago lasted nine days. Today, the free family festival is three days long and runs the third weekend in August. The 2019 event will be held Friday to Sunday, August 16, 17 & 18 and will feature four entertainment stages, event zones, more than 100 vendors and a midway. ## **Canadian National Exhibition:**

Originally called the Toronto Industrial Exhibition when it was founded in 1879, the Canadian National Exhibition (CNE) was meant to foster development of agriculture, industry and the arts. By 1912, the festival was renamed to better represent what the annual event had become. Seen as an end-of-summer ritual by many, the CNE takes place over 18 days leading up to and including Labour Day. To close off each summer, visitors can enjoy rides and games, concerts, shopping and some of the tastiest and most unusual food options.

## **Port Elgin Pumpkinfest:**

The first Port Elgin Pumpkinfest in 1986 attracted about 200 people to the town to increase tourism. In 1991 it expanded to a two-day festival and continued to grow, with crowds of 22,000 visitors at the 1994 event. This year's festival includes a Practically Hip concert, a petting October 5 & 6. ## **Bracebridge Fire and Ice Festival:**

Hosting its 5th annual event, the Fire and Ice Festival brings in more than 50 truckloads of snow to create a huge snow tubing hill in the heart of downtown Bracebridge. The 'ice' reference includes the tubing hill, ice displays, ice sculpture carvings and a children's igloo activity centre.
