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The Georgetown Little Theatre is gearing up to deliver studio shows of the unusual variety.

Entitled Oddities - a Bizarre Evening of Live Entertainment, the performances running over the course of six nights in Georgetown and Acton will feature a series of one-act plays.

They will hit the stage at the Georgetown Little Theatre from Sept. 12-14 and the Acton Town Hall on Sept. 19-21.

The four one-act plays include:

Fair Rosamund And Her Murderer by Don Nigro (directed by Litisha Perez, who's new to the Georgetown Little Theatre): A romance unfolds in an unwitting encounter between a maiden and her as-

sassin. Romance and sanity is questioned in a literal maze of emotions.

One Tennis Shoe by Shel Silverstein (directed by A. Frank Willis Jr., who wrote and directed the hit show Family Affair in 2017): A married couple is forced to confront the many absurdities of life; one such absurdity found in an errant tennis shoe. Will love prevail, or are they mismatched?

Naomi in the Livingroom by Christopher Durang (directed by Cat Wilkinson, who played Blanche in this year's performance of a Streetcar Named Desire): A visit home reveals a dark, twisted, chaotic force. Buckle up, visiting the in-laws doesn't usually writhe around this much.

The Lunatic From Number 7 by Richard Turtle (directed by Marilyn Nicholas-Dahan, who directed Streetcar Named Desire): He's the man with problems to solve, feelings to process and lots to say. The only problem: He's locked in the bathroom all weekend.

A parental advisory has been issued for the plays as they have mature themes.

HALTON KIDNEY WALK SEPT. 14 AT BRONTE CREEK PROVINCIAL PARK

Halton is one of 35 Ontario communities coming together in September for the Kidney Foundation of Canada's Kidney Walk.

The event is being held Saturday, Sept. 14 at Bronte Creek Provincial Park, 1219 Burloak Dr. Registration begins at 10 a.m. and the walk at 11 a.m.

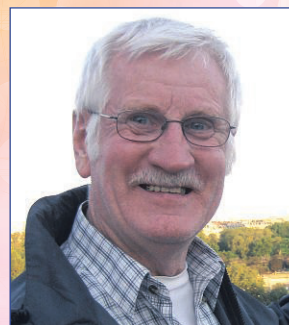
"Kidney Walks are a special opportunity for families, friends and caregivers to rally in support of their loved ones living with kidney disease," said Craig Kerr, President of The Kidney Foundation's Ontario branch.

"When our community comes together it is incredibly inspiring. It is absolutely heartwarming to watch people reconnect year after year at our walk events, as they support one another and extend a warm welcome to new participants."

On average, one in 10 Canadians has kidney disease and millions more are at risk, according to the Kidney Foundation of Canada. Kidney disease is treated with dialysis or a kidney transplant; there is no cure. Over 12,000 Ontarians depend on life-sustaining dialysis treatments several times a week and many of those waiting for a transplant need a kidney.
