POTATOES SUPPLY ENERGY

The potato is pre-eminent among the vegetables used for food. Not only does the potato furnish considerable nutritive food, but it is an easily digestible form. The starch in potatoes is more readily digested than the starch of some other starch-producing foods.

The method of cooking potatoes has some effect upon the quality and food value. Boiled potatoes are most likely to lose in food value during cooking. This loss can be minimized by cooking with the skins on. Baked potatoes lose very little, either in nutrients or in quality when cooked. They are usually more moist than potatoes which have been boiled or steamed.

POTATO RECIPES

Duchess Potatoes To two cups hot riced potatoes add two tablespoons of butter, one-half teaspoon salt and yolks of three eggs, slightly beaten. Shape, using pastry bag with tube, in form of baskets, pyramids, etc. Brush over with beaten egg, diluted with one teaspoon of water, and brown in a hot oven.

Stuffed Potatoes Wash, pare, and cut four potatoes in our-fourth inch slices. Put a layer in a buttered baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper, dredge with flour and dot over with one-half tablespoon of butter. Repeat until all the potatoes are used. A few slices of onion may be added if desired. Add hot milk until it may be seen through the top layer; bake one and one-fourth hours or until potatoes are soft.

Franconia Potatoes Prepare as for boiled potatoes, and parboil ten minutes; drain, and place in pan in which meal is roasting; bake until soft, heating with fat in pan, when heating meat. Time required for baking about forty minutes. Sweet potatoes may be prepared the same way.

Potato Croquettes 2 cups hot riced potatoes 2 tablespoons butter 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1/2 teaspoon celery salt Few grains cayenne Few drops onion juice Yolk one egg 1 teaspoon finely chopped parsley Mix ingredients in order given, and beat thoroughly. Shape, dip in crumbs, egg and crumbs again; fry one minute in deep fat, and drain on brown paper. Croquettes are shaped in a variety of forms. The most common way is to first form a smooth ball by rolling one rounded tablespoon of mixture between hands. Then roll on a board until of desired length, and flatten ends.

A LETTER FROM MONTREAL

Dear Paris Press: The letter sent last week was prepared before reading of the death at Edmonton, of one of Acton's sons, Arthur E. Moore. Not only so, but, as a lad he was assigned with a bunch of other boys in a Sunday School class to the writer in his first year in Acton, 1893. Of that group of boys there have gone forth into the world men in many walks of life and to far distant locations. Whether any great good came of the assignment mentioned is, of course unknown, but at any rate, they have gone abroad. One to the other side of the earth as a merchant; one a copy-reviser for a great publishing establishment, and a writer of stories; one a well-known manufacturer, who became Warden of his native County. Particulars cannot now be recalled of all, but as far as recollection now goes, Arthur is the first break by death. "Work for the night in coming"—work all the way through the various phases of life's day, until "man's work is over."
