

UNITED WAY HELPING CHARITIES HELPING THE VULNERABLE

The United Way Halton & Hamilton is accepting applications for the Emergency Community Support Fund (ECSF) Round 2 until Oct. 30, after an infusion of \$1.1 million from the federal government.

The fund provides financial support to charities adapting their front-line services to continue helping the vulnerable during the pandemic.

"The collaboration between the federal government, our organization, and regional partners has been an honour to participate in," said UWHH vice-president of community impact, Michael Mikulak.

"We will ensure these critical funds reach those who need it most, through processes guided by equity and community knowledge."

The ECSF will be administered through a consultative decision-making process facilitated by UWHH and other community partners. Applicants and interested parties should visit the UWHH website for application process details and more information:

To date during the pan-

demic, UWHH has supported close to 100 projects with almost \$3 million through both locally raised emergency funds and support from the Canadian government and the New Horizons for Seniors Program. UWHH continues to raise funds for long-term stability for community service agencies.

Though the ECSF fund

is helpful to community, it is not enough to satisfy the growing need for community supports, said the UWHH. Demand for social services continues to climb across Canada with individuals, families and neighbourhoods pushed to the limits, and the social sector stretched beyond its capacity to serve them, according to the organization.

"This pandemic has resulted in increased demand for social services

across Canada that were already needed by many of our neighbours. We must pull together to build resilience and stability in our community more now than ever before," says UWHH president and CEO, Brad Park.

"Thank you again to the Government of Canada for this emergency investment, and to our network of supports for their continued commitment to community through our annual campaign."

Notice of Land Transfer - Block 176, Plan 20M-734



This notice is to advise the public that a portion of Block 176, Plan 20M-734 owned by the Town of Halton Hills is intended to be declared surplus to the needs of the Town.

The Town intends to transfer approximately 0.15 acres of the open space block (located south of Princess Ann Drive at the intersection of Atwood Avenue) to the Halton Hills Christian School in exchange for other open space lands owned by the school. The land will be used for the creation of a permanent driveway entrance from Princess Anne Drive, providing a student pickup/drop off area at the back of the Halton Hills Christian School property.

The property exchange is conditional on the approval of a Site Plan Application by the Halton Hills Christian School, including approval of a Traffic Impact Review.
