- Local resident Jodie McGucken said the G&G women's golfing group reached out to the town about the issue after a second duck died crossing the road.

- The town then installed two duck crossing signs on Maple Avenue, east of Halton Hills Drive and west of Gardiner Drive West, in early January.
- "We just want to make sure the public is aware to slow down in this section so we don't lose anymore (ducks)," said McGucken.
- The ducks are said to make their pilgrimage across the road twice a day.
