Throughout June, the town is inviting residents to learn more about the history, contemporary and traditional arts, and culture of Indigenous peoples in Canada.

"As part of the town's commitment to advancing Truth and Reconciliation. we will be including a land acknowledgement at the beginning of council meetings, starting at the June 14 meeting," Mayor Rick Bonnette said. "The

Town of Halton Hills is located on the Treaty Lands and Territory of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, and it is important that we recognize this and build relationships with Indigenous Nations."

- Shining a Light on Contemporary Inuit Art: Virtual talk with Heather Muir Beecroft (June 9, 7-8 p.m.).
- No Word for Art: Exploring the Indigenous Roots of Creativity: virtual talk with Naomi Smith, Indigenous artist and educator (June 14, 7-8:30 p.m.).
- · Indigenous Family Storytime: Shared virtually from the Halton Hills Public Library (June 23, 10:30 a.m. on YouTube).
