RAINBOW CROSSWALK INSTALLED IN ACTON

Acton residents may notice a touch more colour in town, thanks to a newly-completed project to celebrate diversity and inclusivity.

The Town of Halton Hills installed and celebrated its second rainbow crosswalk Tuesday (June 15) in support of the 2SLGBTQ+ community.

"This crosswalk doesn't solve our problems," said Stella Skinner, a grade seven student at Mckenzie-Smith Bennett, "But it shows the Town is trying to change."

Stella's mother, Jess Skinner, said the crosswalk was an important moment

"When Stella transitioned there wasn't any conversation like this — it almost felt hostile. Seven years later, there are allies popping up everywhere," Jess said.

Stella was the first student to raise the Pride flag at her school.

"We're being celebrated," Stella said. "It's not just a flag that will come down at the end of the month — this will be there for a long time."

The crosswalk was also welcomed by Hailey Canning, a 16-year-old transgender Acton resident who came out to watch the unveiling.

"The crosswalk shows that the government cares about us and supports us," she said.

Mother Lisa Canning said the new installation also represents having pride in the journey to get to your true self.

"It's about being proud of who you are now so that everyone can see you're a valuable part of the community," she said.

While the event was held virtually, several members of the community attended the socially-distanced ceremony.

"These crosswalks serve as a permanent symbol of the Town's commitment to support diversity and inclusion in Halton Hills," said Mayor Rick Bonnette.

Similar to the rainbow crosswalk installed in Georgetown last year, the new Acton crosswalk is a short distance from the Halton Hills Public Library.

"Having safe and inclusive spaces is part of our niche," Melanie Southern, chief librarian of the HHPL said about the crosswalk's location.

Acton's rainbow crosswalk is located at the intersection of Main St. and River St.
