criminates against and disadvantages the sizable percentage of non-Catholic students in board schools.

Andrew Lokan, a lawyer with Paliare Roland Barristers, said in a statement that the policy may well be discriminatory, but Catholic school boards hold a special position within the coun-

"Although they discriminate against non-Catholics on their face, they are reasonably related to the special position that Catholic school boards have had since Confederation, as repeatedly reaffirmed by the courts. While there are some recent cases that might support a challenge, it is my opinion that they would likely survive challenge," reads the statement from Lokan.

The requirement that a student trustee be Catholic is one that, arguably, violates both the Ontario Human Rights Code and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, both of which prohibit discrimination on the basis of religion. However, Lokan points out the courts have repeatedly found that Catholic boards hold a unique position that goes back to 1867.

A key case around the issue is Daly v. Ontario from the late '90s. In that case, the court found that Catholic boards were permitted to favour Catholic teachers when hiring.

"The Ontario Court of Appeal held that the rights and privileges of denominational schools at the time of Confederation implicitly included the right to prefer Catholics as teachers. As such, a provision in the Education Act that purported to prevent Catholic school boards from taking into account the religion of teachers, as long as the teacher respected the philosophy of the school, was unconstitutional," said Lokan in his statement.

Being a student trustee does come with a number of advantages including providing a \$2,500 scholarship and a letter of commendation from the board chair.

The total cost to receive the legal opinion from Lokan was not available at the time it was reported.

The board of trustees had received another legal opinion on the matter earlier in the year, but that statement was not made public.
