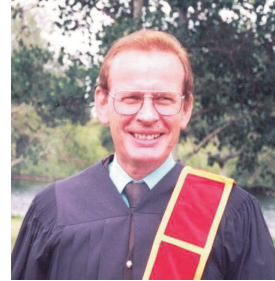
**ARMSTRONG, Doris**

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of our beloved aunt, Doris Armstrong. She was born in Georgetown, Ontario, Canada, younger sister to Bill—a lifelong supporter and proud older brother of Doris's many accomplishments. Doris's call to nursing was influenced by her great aunt, a nurse and uncle—a physician who made house calls and removed Doris's and her brother's tonsils on their kitchen table. She trained as an operating room nurse at Brantford General Hospital School of Nursing, the same school her aunt attended. In 1949, she earned a Scholarship to the University of Toronto and later, two degrees from Johns Hopkins University—a reflection of her belief in continuing education and lifelong learning. Doris began her professional career as a staff nurse in the operating room at Johns Hopkins Hospital and went on to become director of Operative and Acute Care Services and then Director of the Hospital's entire nursing service until 1976. From there, Doris went to Hartford Hospital to become Vice President of Nursing where she spent 15 years advancing patient-centered initiatives that promoted improved services through measurable standards of care, collaborative practices with physicians and other staff and advanced nurse practitioner programs. Throughout her career Doris distinguished herself both nationally and internationally as a healthcare professional. Upon Doris's retirement in 1991, John J. Meehan, then president and chief executive officer of Hartford Hospital described

her accomplishments and contribution to the hospital as well as the nursing profession overall, as having "...made a mark that will remain in place for a long time to come, consistently distinguishing herself as the consummate nurse, administrator and overall professional." Of course, to us she was simply Doris, our dad's vibrant and always fun sister who visited often and who became such an important part of our family. As we grew older, we came to understand and appreciate the breadth of Doris's accomplishments. What makes her memory so special to us and to anyone who knew her were the personal bonds she established, through her kindness, her support and her capacity to mentor. Doris's extraordinary empathy and the respect and kindness that she showed everyone she dealt with throughout her life, remained a part of her to the end. We will cherish that along with the many wonderful memories of the life she shared with us. Doris is predeceased by her parents, her brother Bill and many incredibly special friends. 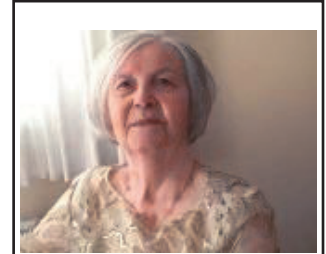
