Georgetown GO Station/Mill St. Corridor Secondary Plan Steering Committee - Call for Applicants



The Town of Halton Hills is looking for five volunteers to serve on the Georgetown GO Station Area/Mill Street Corridor Secondary Plan Review Steering Committee.

The review will examine best methods of intensification within existing high density and mixed-use areas while protecting the natural heritage and historic low-density neighbourhoods of the plan area. Conducted over approximately two years, the Georgetown GO Station/Mill Street Corridor secondary plan review will be a community-integrated process shaped by input from the public and key stakeholders while considering local plans and priorities.

#### **Steering Committee Duties:**

- Provide feedback on deliverables of the review throughout the study;
- Assist with identifying issues and proposing solutions;
- Liaise with key community stakeholders to ensure public awareness of the study;
- Meet as needed, to monitor the progress of the review.

#### **Applicant Eligibility Criteria:**

- Must be a resident of, or hold property within, or adjacent to, the Secondary Plan area
- Must be over the age of 18 years
- May not be a Town of Halton Hills employee
- Representatives from established neighbourhood groups and associations are welcome and encouraged to apply

- Applicants must apply by Monday, March 28, 2022 at 4:30 p.m.

# 'I WOULDN'T CHANGE A THING'

### LOCAL MAN Cherishes Jeopardy! Experience

If it seemed like a dream, it quickly became very real for Evan Freeman.

"As soon as they start, and they say 'From the Alex Trebek stage.' And then they say, 'A vet from Georgetown, Ontario, Canada.""

"I'm getting goosebumps just talking about it now," Freeman says, recalling the taping of his Jeopardy! episode in January.

The trivia buff dreamed of being on the show since watching it with his grandfather on Friday nights as a kid. And it became a reality when the show aired last Wednesday (Mar. 16).

So how did he do? Alright, alright, alright.

He ticked off his Jeopardy! bucket list items. He played a daily double. He made it to Final Jeopardy. He answered the Final Jeopardy question correctly.

The lone box left unchecked: he didn't win.

Freeman correctly an-

swered the Final Jeopardy question — the first three words spoken by Matthew McConaughey in a movie (see above) — but when Katie Hargrove also got the answer, Freeman had to settle for second.

"I wouldn't change a thing," Freeman said. "It was one of the best days of my life, and I get to see puppies and kittens every day."

Freeman started well, getting answers in four different categories to take the lead into the first commercial break and was just \$1,200 behind Hargrove at the end of the round.

"You're playing against really skilled people," he said. "At the end of the first round, I'm thinking, 'Hey, I'm holding my own here."

Though he got a slow start in the second round, Freeman got a chance to make up for it when he got the Daily Double. He always planned to bet everything if he got the chance and when it came up in science and medicine, there was no doubt.

However, the question about the force that resists motion through air tripped him up, wiping out the \$5,400 he had earned to that point.

Freeman has no regrets. "You could have asked me that question 100 times and I don't know that I would have got it," he said. "Maybe if it was phrased in a different way."

He didn't let it rattle him, though. He got the next four questions — with his pre-show studying of texting abbreviations paying off — restoring almost everything he lost to give himself a chance in Final Jeopardy.

As for that tattoo he mentioned in the player introductions, he hasn't got it yet, but he's leaning toward a Liverpool F.C. crest rather than the Ken Jennings portrait he joked about with the Jeopardy! host on the show.

Freeman, just the second Canadian Jeopardy! contestant in the past two years, said the amount of support he's received since people found out he was going to be on the show has been overwhelming.

And even though he lived the experience two months ago, Freeman was looking forward to seeing it from another perspective.

"You always think you did worse than you did," he said. "But my kids were excited. As soon as they heard Jeopardy! starting, they ran to the TV. My daughter was filming it with the iPad. At least they'll always be able to say, 'My dad was on Jeopardy!"
