BREAK-INS LEAVE IMPACT ON VICTIMS

HOMEOWNERS LEFT WITH FEELING OF VIOLATION

The following is the final instalment in a four-part Halton series on crime in the region.

In early 2020, two Halton homeowners returned to their property, where they found an unfamiliar vehicle in their driveway. When they went inside, they found two men who got into the home by smashing the back window.

The two burglars fled upon being discovered and were apprehended a short time later.

With the exception of the part about the homeowners happening to return home in the middle of the crime, this incident — which was detailed in the Halton Regional Police Service (HRPS) Annual Report 2020 — is not particularly unique to Halton Hills or the re-
