The initiative is a grassroots project to uncover and shine a light on the positives, to seek change and grow momentum, she said.

"It's an open invitation to students, staff, families and all supporters of the Halton District School Board and beyond. We're asking you to lend us your positive education experiences and your imagination."

ReImagine Forward launched Friday, April 22 at engagehdsb.ca and will remain open until May 23,

with the community, as well as the ministry of education and provincial organizations.

"Hopefully, it will be a good counterbalance to the stress, the challenge, the oppositions, the unhealthy that we've experienced over the last couple of years; put us on a different trajectory," said Ehl Harrison.

Participants will need to register so trustees can determine where information is coming from, added Burlington trustee Andrea Grebenc.

"We all have ideas on education, how to make it better, how to envision a future for education and we want to hear from everybody students, parents, community members, industry," said Grebenc.

- May 15, 2022 | 8 a.m. to noon


