

BE CAUTIOUS AROUND WILD BIRDS, RESIDENTS WARNED

CASES OF FLU-STRICKEN BIRDS **BEING REPORTED**

Credit Valley Conservation (CVC) is asking residents to exercise caution around wild birds due to an increase in bird flu cases in southern Ontario.

In an April 25 statement, the conservation authority, whose jurisdiction includes Halton Hills, noted the Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative and the Cana-



dian Food Inspection Agency are currently responding to cases of avian influenza virus (AIV) in southern Ontario.

As such, residents are asked to exercise caution around wild birds at conservation areas, as well as in parks, neighbourhoods and yards.

The conservation authority also advises against handling wild birds and asks that residents who have bird feeders and baths follow Government of Canada guidelines at www.canada.ca/en/environment-climate-change/services/migratory-game-bird-hunting/avian-influenza-wild-birds.html#toc3.

The bird flu is a naturally occurring, contagious respiratory viral infection affecting birds.

Credit Valley Conservation noted the current strain of AIV found in southern Ontario, H5N1, is known to spread quickly and cause mass bird mortality.

The bird flu can infect wild and domestic birds, but is unlikely to transfer to humans. Anyone who encounters an injured. ill or dead bird within a CVC conservation area is asked to call 1-800-668-5557. If the bird is found outside a CVC conservation area, call the Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative at 1-866-673-4781.

DOZENS OF STUDENTS AWARDED PRIZES AT SCIENCE FAIR

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION REQUESTS NOW AVAILABLE ONLINE

In Canada, citizens have the right to request information from public sector organizations, or correct information about themselves, under Freedom of Information (FOI) laws.

The process typically involves mailing in a paper letter to the organization of con-

However, Halton Regional Police Service is breaking with tradition and launching an online platform for making FOI requests "in an effort to harness technology, enhance efficiency and better serve members of the public," police say in a press re-

Residents can now go to haltonpolice.ca/foi to make their FOI request online. Police hope that this will streamline the process and make creating a request available 24/7.

Fees can now be paid online instead of through a cheque. "Upon completing their online application, the requestor will get an electronic confirmation that the request has been received and that it will be reviewed shortly," Const. Steve Elms said

"The online application process is an intake process. Intake, via online or paper, will continue to be processed in the order received," he added.

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
