# **4 THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT TOWN'S PLAN TO BATTLE LDD MOTHS**

With the return of warmer weather, Halton Hills is putting a response plan in place to protect its tree canopy from potential destruction by Lymantria dispar dispar (LDD) moths.

Here's everything you need to know about the strategy that was approved by Halton Hills council during its most recent meeting:

1. The plan to combat the moths will include a combination of traps, limited ground spraying of biopesticides on municipal land, free burlap kits for residents to protect trees on their property, public education, along with surveys of egg masses and tree defo-

"Staff is confident that these actions will increase the town's understanding of the current LDD moth outbreak and provide increased tools to mitigate any impacts in 2022," said

town director of public works Mark Covert in a report to council.

2. He noted that Halton Hills has experienced several LDD outbreaks over the last few decades, with residents raising concerns over the increasing moth population in recent years—something he said could be due to not only outbreak severity, but the fact more people have been getting outdoors during the pandemic.

3. Over the past two years, moth traps have been deployed to municipal trees where caterpillars were known to be present to capture flying male moths, which reduced mating opportunities.

While it seemed like the caterpillars were everywhere, Covert wrote that there was minimal defoliation of municipal trees observed last year, and "there are signs that an LDD population collapse may be on the horizon."

4. The town contracted Credit Valley Conservation (CVC) in 2021 to assess the LDD moth population locally. After surveying 80 sites - including town-owned woodlot, park and street tree locations - it was concluded that 25 per cent of the locations have the potential for severe defoliation this

"The northern and western areas of Georgetown had the highest concentration of sites with a potential for moderate to severe defoliation in 2022," noted Covert in his report.

Details are still to come on when and where the free burlap kits will be available for residents.
