# LOCAL COUPLE RETURNING TO 'DRAGONS' DEN'

### WILL OFFER UPDATE ON THEIR ONLINE LEGAL **DOCUMENTS BUSINESS**

A couple with Georgetown roots will be featured on "Dragons' Den" Sept. 22 for success in establishing an online legal documents tool.

"Our research shows that 57 per cent of Canadian adults don't have a will and our hope is to reach more families," said Willful CEO Erin Bury.

Battling an unexpected life-threatening medical condition — and fearing the worst — the couple realized the importance of being prepared for emergency situations.

Through the cost-effective online tool to create wills, power of attorneys, beneficiaries and other legal documents, Bury aims to motivate individuals to "prioritize end of life planning."

After pitching their business Willful — on "Dragons' Den" and scoring a deal from Michele Romanow in December 2021, it will be Bury's and her husband Kevin Oulds' second time on the show.

With the show scheduled to air on CBC at 8 p.m., the husband-and-wife duo will feature in the "Where Are They Now?" segment, focusing on business advancements over the last vear.

In December — with support from Romanow — Willful executed the first digital will in Canadian history in British Columbia.

Since being established in 2017, Willful has helped create over 100,000 legal documents with free unlimited updates, states the Willful website.

Bury said with an increasing number of people prioritizing emergency planning during the pandemic, the business nearly doubled its revenue last year.

Willful has also partnered with CIBC bank to offer a promotional price to customers.

"Our Georgetown community has been hugely helpful in spreading the word about Willful. From recommending us on Facebook groups to spreading the word in person, we've really felt the love from the community," Bury

Currently operating in eight provinces. Willful aims to expand services across Canada. The organization is also working to offer funeral and burial planning options.
